Todd Bertuzzi had two goals and two assists — tying his career-high for points in a game — as Vancouver shutout the Nashville Predators 5-0 on Tuesday night.

"We wanted to make sure we started out right against Nashville," Bertuzzi said. "We wanted to smother them. "They're known as a team that

comes out of the gate really strong. We wanted to come out physical. I think we basically smothered them and took

over the game."
Brendan Morrison added a goal and two assists for the Canucks, who held the Predators to only one first-period shot tying Nashville's record low set in 1999, also against the Canucks. Artem

"We talked about coming out and dominating a team," said Nashville coach Barry Trotz. "Tonight was not our night. We were embarrassed by the first period. I am surprised by the lack of resiliency. It is not a Predator trademark, and it will be resolved."
Nashville finished with only 22 shots.

Nashville finished with only 23 shots on goal, giving Vancouver goaltender Dan Cloutier his sixth shutout of the season and the seventh of his career

The Canucks failed to score on 15 firstperiod shots, but found the net on four of 21 second-period shots against goaltender Mike Dunham. Tomas Vokoun re-placed Dunham to start the third.

The Canucks wore down the Predators with their solid play down low.
"That's a staple of our team ... be in

good condition and take it down low," Bertuzzi said. "We've got a lot of little guys so it's a matter of working their defence and our working and coming

up with chances."

DALLAS (CP) — The Dallas Stars ave traded left-winger Martin Rucinsky and centre Roman Lyashenko to the New York Rangers for left-wingers Manny Malhotra and Barrett Heisten, the NHL team announced Tuesday night.

Malhotra, 21, has seven goals and six

assists in 56 games with the Rangers this season, along with 42 penalty minutes. The six-foot-two, 215-pound winger has appeared in 206 career NHL games, collecting 19 goals and 22 as-

sists with 90 penalty minutes. "He brings size, speed and a competitive nature that is very important at this time of year," said Dallas GM Doug Armstrong. "He was the key to the trade for the Dallas Stars."

A first-round draft choice (seventh overall) by the Rangers in the 1998 entry draft, Malhotra broke into the league in the 1998-99 season with a careerbest eight goals and eight assists

He is expected to join the Stars in Montreal in time for a game Thurs-day night. Dallas is in the midst of a four-game road trip that includes Toronto on Saturday and Chicago next Monday. The Stars began the

road trip by beating the Washington Capitals 5-2 Tuesday night. Heisten, 21, has been assigned on loan to the AHL Utah Grizzlies. He had appeared in 10 games with the Rangers at the beginning of the sea-son, going scoreless. Buffalo's first-round pick (20th overall) in the 1999 entry draft, Heisten also has played in 49 games this season with the AHL Hartford Wolf Pack, collecting nine goals and nine assists. A member of the University of Maine's 1999 NCAA championship team who jumped to the Western Hockey League's Seattle Thunderbirds in his 20-year-old sea-son, Heisten made his NHL debut this season on Oct. 5 at Carolina

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## Raiders find their coach

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — The Oakland Raiders promoted offensive co-ordinator Bill Callahan to head coach Tuesday t, three weeks after Jon Gruden left to coach Tampa Bay

In typical Raiders fashion, their big announcement was made quietly by fax and e-mail. The Raiders are to introduce Callahan, a seven-year NFL assistant with no head coaching experience, during a news conference Wednesday at their Alameda training facility.

There was little suspense in the Raiders' decision. Though

the team said it conducted an extensive search for its new coach, apparently considering former Minnesota coach Dennis Green and Kansas City offensive co-ordinator Al Saunders, Callahan was the clear favourite to continue Gruden's successful tenure — simply because he never left the building.

Callahan, who's popular with the Raiders' veteran roster of offensive players, remained under contract to Oakland when Gruden left for Tampa Bay. In fact, Gruden's entire staff has remained at work full-time in Alameda since the

popular young coach's departure. Callahan, a Chicago native and a former NAIA quarterback at Illinois Benedictine, is the latest in the long line of offensive-minded head coaches favoured by Raiders owner Al Davis.

Callahan spent four seasons as Gruden's offensive co-ordinator in Oakland — also coaching the offensive line and tight ends at different points — after working with Gruden as the Philadelphia Eagles' offensive line coach from 1995-97.

Last weekend, the Raiders hired Jay Norvell, a longtime friend of Callahan, to be their tight ends coach even though Norvell had accepted a job at Oklahoma one month earlier further evidence that there was a clear front-runner in

Callahan, who was an assistant coach at Illinois and Wisconsin earlier in his career, now must tackle the difficult job of following in the footsteps of Gruden, the baby-faced coach who became the Raider Nation's hero during the team's return to power culminating in AFC West championships the last two seasons.

Gruden was 40-28 in four seasons with the Raiders, including two division titles and a 2-2 mark in the playoffs.

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
