Peace River Development

(Continued from page 1)

From Hudson's Hope to Fort St. John is a distance of 60 miles. The country is generally level and is covered for the most part with small poplar, willow and alder, with here and there small patches of spruce. There is practically no merchantable timber to be found, though there is an abundance of material suitable for the building of cabins and fences. The river has cut its channel from five to eight hundred feet below the general level of the country through which it passes. For this reason very little good land is found in the bottoms along the river. North and west of Hudson's Hope, on the nearly level plateau, is a tract of about 17,000 acres surveyed for pre-emption. This tract and another of about 10,000 acres in the valley of the Halfway River, a tributary of the Peace, to the west of the Dominion Block, homesteads within the borders of which must be obtained from the agents of the Dominion Government, are shown on pre-emptors' map No. 5, Peace River sheet. All this country is well watered with numerous streams.

Hudson's Hope may be taken as marking the eastern boundary of the foothills. To the east the country rapidly becomes prairie-like in formation and lies slightly over 2,000 feet above sea level. From Hudson's Hope to Fort St. John the river has a steady current of about three to six miles per hour, depending upon the stage of water, but presents no difficulties to navigation. Fort St. John is one of the important posts of the Hudson's Bay Company, large quantities of fur being received annually. Thirty miles below the fort Cutbank River comes in from the south and a few miles below this river the Alberta boundary is reached.

The boundary line between the two provinces also marks the eastern boundary of the Dominion Gov-

ernment's Peace River block, which is a fine tract of land 78 miles square and containing 3,500,000 acres. It was conveyed by the provincial government to the Dominion government for the purpose of opening it for settlement, and will undoubtedly some day be again placed under the control of the province. The block contains some of the finest land in the province. The prairies extend westward from the boundary to the foothills, a distance of one hundred miles in places. The country, hills and all, seems to be covered with a rich black loam of varying degrees of thickness, overlying a clay, and in some cases, a sand sub-soil. The wild vegetation is rich and luxurious; rye-grass; red-top, wild timothy, buffalo grass/blue-joint and peavine grow everywhere to a great height.

Nearly the whole of the Peace River block north of the Peace River has splendid soil for agricultural purposes, and it is about twenty-five per cent prairie or lightly wooded. Most of the open prairie is along the Peace River and its tributaries. Between the Pine and Cutbank Rivers, on the south side of the Peace, there is some heavily timbered country, but as the Cutbank is approached the country becomes more open and finally changes into prairie country and is known as the Pouce Coupe Prairie, a great stretch of almost level, lightly wooded land, with excellent black loam soil.
