HUDSON BAY RAILWAY IS AGAIN DELAYED

Winnipeg, Jan. 18.—Owing to the impossibility of getting steel rails, which are not manufactured at the present, it will not be feasible to attempt to finish the Hudson Bay railway this year, J. D. McArthur states. He believes it will cost about \$4,000,000 to complete the line, and he is willing to go on as contractor and finish it when the government gives the word. Ninety-two miles remain to be built, from Kettle Rapids to Port Nelson; there are 340 miles already built from The Pas.

Mr. McArthur denies that he has been approached in any manner with reference to the purchase by the Canadian National Railway Board of the Edmonton, Dunvegan & Peace River Railway. It had been reported that the government would take over the road on May 1.

HUNS USED WILD BEES ON BRITISH IN AFRICA

San Francisco, Jan. 18.—Swarms of wild bees were used by German troops when they sought to prevent the landing of British troops at Langa, German East Africa, making possible the effective use of machine guns, according to R. M. Ewart, superintendent of the British East Africa police, who has arrived here en route to London. The German troops, Ewart said, instructed natives to collect millions of wild bees in wooden hives. These hives were kept in readiness, and when the British troops landed the bees were released.

"The angry insects swarmed about the men and horses," Ewart said, "and while the men were fighting them off, many of them suffering intensely from scores of stings, the Germans turned loose with machine guns, inflicting heavy casualties."

PREMIER OLIVER WOULD HELP MOTHERS

Victoria, Jan. 18.—Premier Oliver has promised full consideration of a request for the establishment of mothers' pensions preferred by a large delegation representing both Mainland and Island interests. He urged those who suggested the plan to initiate a campaign to bring the public to an appreciation of the fact that if public expenditures for any such purpose are to be made the people must be prepared to contribute the cost.

NO HALF MEASURES WITH THE GERMANS

London, Jan. 18.—The Express today declared that armies would "march straight to Berlin if the armistice terms are not fully carried out." Anything else, it declared, would be but a half measure. The newspaper announced the belief that Germany is neither willing nor able to go through with its agreements as set forth in the text of the armistice, and points to the failure to deliver promised supplies.

General von Winterfeld, member of the German armistice commission, has sent a note to the Allied armistice commission at Spa

declaring that "Germany is holding captured material until the peace treaty is signed," according to a wireless despatch from Berlin.
