RETURNED SOLDIERS.

Few Canadian soldiers have seen longer service against the Hun "over there" than E. H. Burden, an early day land surveyor in this district and nephew of F. P. Burden of Fort George. Enlisting early in 1915 in the C.M.R., "Ernie" went through all the desperate battles of the early days. He received a shrapnel wound in the foot at Ypres and for a time it appeared probable that he would lose the member. Good surgical work was responsible for the almost complete restoration of the injury and he was transferred to the flying corps. When the armistice was signed he had practically completed the course of aerial training and was ready for his commission. Mr. Burden has resumed his profession of land surveyor and is at present employed by the Dominion government in the Hazelton district.

Another early resident of this district returning from overseas this week is George Roussell, late postmaster and merchant of Dewey. He left here in 1916 and saw considerable active service and after the armistice was signed was with the Canadian army of occupation in Germany. He is returning to Dewey to resume business.
