GOAT BREEDERS' NEWS.

(By Geo. Pilmer, in Goat World.)

Mr. N. F. Tunbridge, of Penticton, is deriving considerable satisfaction from the herd of fifty grade does he imported last fall; 17 of them kidded early in the spring and all he has tested have given two quarts per day two months after freshening. Twenty-eight more are due to kid soon, and Mr. Tunbridge is looking for some fine kids. So far Mr. Tunbridge has not lost a kid and reports his young stock vigorous and growing fast. He has just shipped two goats to the Atlantic seaboard and expects to send a few more off soon to the east. Two more babies owe their lives to goats' milk. Mr. Tunbridge having been able to supply them with same with splendid results when nothing else was of any use.

Mr. C. W. Moore deplors the lack of goats in the northern country and the difficulty of getting them in. Being so far away from the source of supply, and transportation rates being so high, northern people are considerably handicapped in securing stock. This is all the more a pity because the feed is so abundant that the cost of keeping goats would be practically nil, the wonderfully luxuriant growth of peavine and native grasses solving the problem. In addition, the goats would be of inestimable value in helping to clear the land and prepare it for the crops. Mr. Moore thinks one of the easiest ways to reduce the cost of living would be for the government to import a few car-loads of goats and distribute them throughout the country.

For the benefit of those whose goats are bothered with foot trouble, Mr. D. G. Richardson of Vancouver has passed on a tip which he found efficacious. One of his goats was so tender on the feet that she had considerable difficulty in walking properly, so, after trimming the hoofs he dipped his finger in Stockholm tar and rubbed it around the quick, inside and out, and it looks like a permanent cure. Mr. Richardson intends to put at least two goats and two kids in the Vancouver Fair.

Mr. D. H. Dick of North Vancouver is one of the fortunate ones, having had five does out of six kids this year, and all doing well. He made a young convert the other day when he gave a five-year-old boy his first glass of goat's milk. The boy emptied the glass, and, without waiting to get his breath, turned to his father and said: "Thay, Dada, that's thousand times gooder milk as old cow's milk!"

Mr. M. J. Moncton, of Sidney, wonders why goats do not drink more water, because, as he says (and as the city milkman has proved in a different sense), more water should produce more milk. In this connection I have found that when goats are ranging in brush, and have plenty of shade, they do not seem to need much water to drink.

BIG HAMMERS USED TO KILL ONE THOUSAND RUSSIANS

Constantinople, via London, Sept. 5.—More than 1000 persons were executed by the Bolsheviks before they evacuated the city of Yekaterin-
slav in southern Russia, according to a despatch received here from that city giving an account of the massacres, by a physician who was the principal medical expert present at the opening of the pits into which the bodies of these victims had been cast after their execution.

This physician, Dr. Robin, declares the victims' heads had been crushed with hammers and their bodies badly mutilated. Many of them, he says, were found with broken legs and ribs caused by blows with sledge hammers, specimens of which were found in the vicinity. The physician tells of the case of one officer who missed being struck by the firing squad bullets and escaped the Bolsheviks who came along bayoneting the wounded by simulating death.

STEAMER LINE TO B. C.

London, Sept. 4.—It is announced by the agent-general for British Columbia that arrangements have been completed with the Johnson Line for a monthly steamer service with 6000 ton vessels between Havre, Christiania and British ports on one side and British Columbia on the other.

This move is regarded as an attempt to force Alberta wheat through Pacific ports which can offer a rate only half that paid over the railway by way of Montreal.

Hon. A. L. Sifton, minister of customs and inland revenue in the Union government, has been sworn in as minister of public works in succession to F. B. Carvell, who was recently appointed chairman of the board of railway commissioners.

The Prince of Wales has been compelled to give up shaking hands owing to the painful condition caused by the heartiness of the grip of Montrealers. He had to greet his Toronto admirers with his left hand.

PRESERVATION OF FRUITS AND VEGETABLES

In canned goods there are two kinds of spoilage. The first is called "flat sour," which includes all forms of bacterial growth that develop within the food. The second type of spoilage to guard against is mould, a plant growth that is distinctly different from the bacterial growth. Moulded foods are seldom more than surface affected, because air is necessary for its growth, but the flat sour spoilage means that the entire can must be discarded. Bulletin No. 93 of the Dominion Experimental Farms "Preservation of Fruits and Vegetables for Home Use," which may be had on application to the Publications Branch, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, gives full information on the various methods of canning, including old and valuable recipes as well as new ones which have been found valuable. Canning has become the most popular means of preserving large quantities of fruit and vegetables, and since these are plentiful during the summer months and at other times difficult to obtain it is important to preserve quantities during the growing season for use in winter. Moreover the use of an abundant supply of fruit and green vegetables is essential to health at all seasons.
