Export outlook termed gloomy

prospects for exports of minerals and

forest products are gloomy, two industry spokesmen said Monday. Jack Butterfield, director of min-ing for Placer Development Ltd., and Jack Croll, director of financial services for MacMillan Bloedel Ltd., spoke to a board of trade seminar.

Mr. Butterfield said the Canadian share of world mineral production and exports will decrease over the long term, with the gross probably averaging less than three per cent

"This is in sharp contrast to the more favorable period, 1950-1974, when the real gross averaged about six per cent."

He said if the gross of the Canadian industry kept pace with world demand, the value of Canadian out-put would reach \$15 billion by the year 2000.

He said the investment climate for minerals in Canada is considered poor because it is difficult to find Canadians who will work in remote

"Taxation is probably the most serious factor. The current apparent rate of tax is 50 to 90 per cent, depending on prices, the minerals involved and the province.

Mr. Butterfield said another problem was the "capricious nature of government, particularly in relation to taxation."

He also said the developed world "may be unable to generate the amount of capital which is necessary to undertake all the capital projects which the world requires." Mr. Croll said the potential of Rus-

sian competition in forestry is a growing concern for Canadian forest companies. The USSR has 14.7 trillion board feet of the world's softwood

timber, compared with North America's 8.7 board feet, Mr. Croll

He said the exportation of Cana-dian forestry technology to Russia generates no further Canadian busi-

Mr. Croll also said the Canadian industry is concerned about fast-growing species of timber, a com-petitive threat which is long-term but

He also said American tax policies allow companies to generate more capital to replace facilities.

"If they are unable to generate or otherwise develop the capital they need, Canadian producers will have to manufacture their products with older and less efficient equipment, and as a consequence, at a higher unit cost," he said.

"Canadian industry must receive the same recognition of its need for that capital through a tax system that will allow it to maintain its competitiveness, Mr. Croll said.

J. M. McAvity, president of the Canadian Export Association, told the seminar that the association's preliminary survey of exporters showed there is deep concern at the implications of the federal government's planned export levy.

"We have had figures from 12 companies which suggest that the effects will be very serious," said Mr. McAvity. "These 12 alone report that the levy will mean 3,000 jobs becoming vacant and potential export income of \$210 million being lost

Mr. McAvity said the existing system of export and import licences already gives more than adequate protection with respect to serving the domestic market first.
