Nicholas Prince, chief of the Necoslie band council, feels too much time is being wasted arguing about "legal garbage" while not enough attention is being paid to the historical background of the land claims dispute.

In the following article, Prince explains why he feels B.C.'s history since the coming of the white man has been "the story of a continuing rip-off of Indian land."


signed to the post of assistant district forester for the Prince Rupert district.

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
