## Value school graduates can't make decisions

VANCOUVER (CP) - Children who graduate from value schools will be torn apart by an inability to make their own decisions in the adult world, Dr. Gerrold Coombs, a researcher at the University of

British Columbia, says. Speaking at a B.C. Home and School Federation panel discussion, Dr. Coombs argued that value school supporters will leave their children at a severe disadvantage when it comes to dealing with conflicting values in society.

"Take the question of whether it's right to lie so that we don't hurt someone," said Dr. Coombs. "Often to save someone's feeling it's quite right to tell a lie but if the child hasn't learned how to reason he can be torn apart in a situation where he has to make such

a decision.
"The (value school supporters) say they want children to grow up as responsible adults but on the other hand they're not going to allow those chil-dren to determine their own

"You can't have it both says.

If you have the school system fractionalized children will never learn to reason with others who have different values." David Griffin, chairman of the B.C. steering committee for value schools said that "60 years ago people had an idea what to expect in values" but that today such actions as homosexuality and incest are being freely discus-


