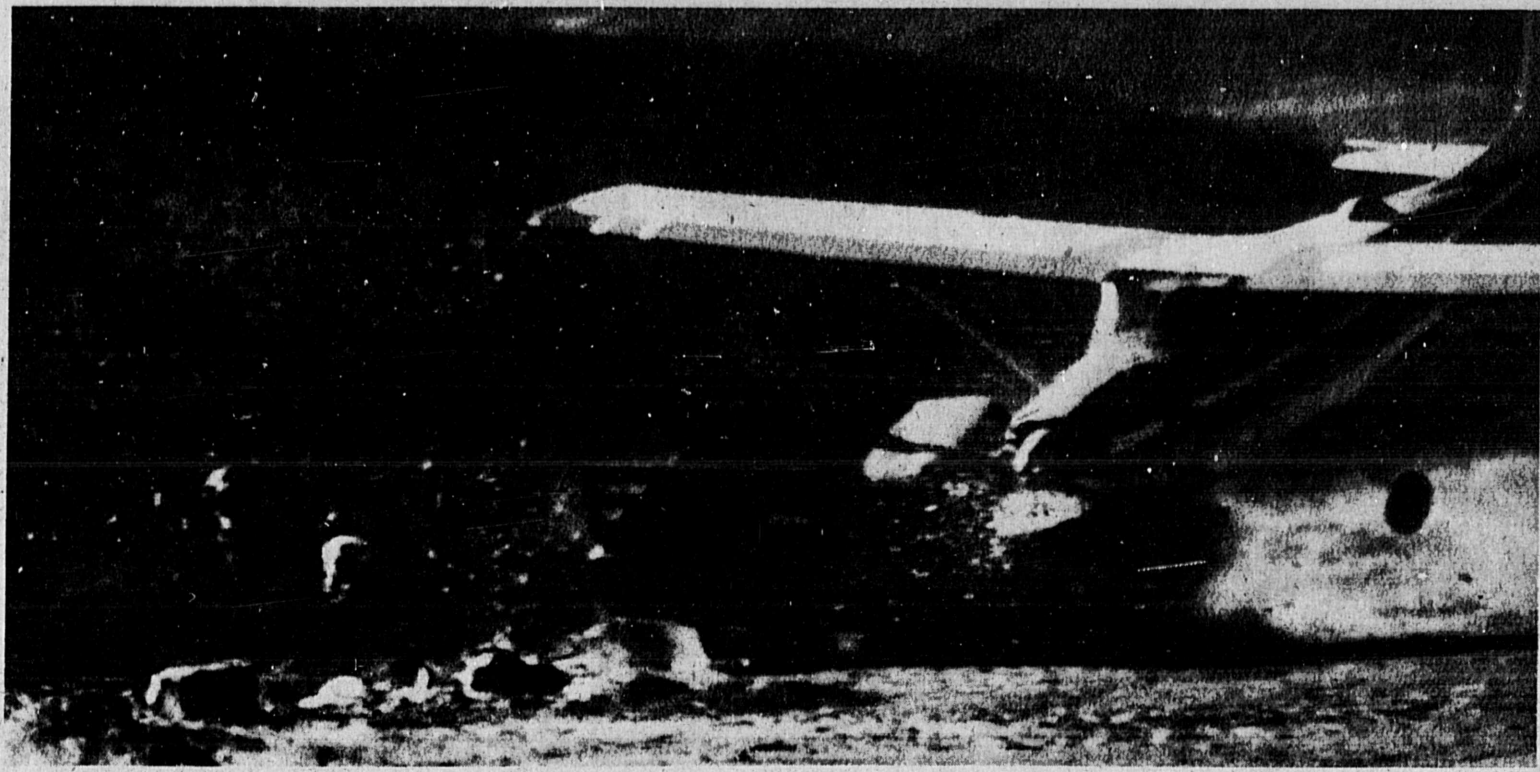

Mars' expedition set
for landing in month

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — The moment of truth is approaching at 6,000 miles an hour for scientists at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory, the base camp for the U.S. expedition to Mars in search of life.

At that speed, the first Viking spacecraft of two is overtaking the red planet and preparing for a landing July 4.

"When June 1 rolled around, everyone suddenly realized that after eight years we're only a month away," said a veteran scientist.

The pitch of anticipation has jumped a notch at this control centre for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) mission.

Engineers are beaming commands to the four-ton automated space explorer, checking its sophisticated instruments. Scientists from across the U.S. are arriving and project officials meet constantly. The question of just how the news would be broken

if life were found is suddenly being seriously discussed.

The lead Viking ship, launched last August, is only two million miles from Mars after travelling about 400 million miles from earth. On June 19 the spacecraft will swing into an orbit around Mars and begin scanning its appointed landing place, the mouth of a vast valley, in preparation for descending to the surface.

The landing is the crucial and ticklish climax of the eight-year billion-dollar project that is the most sophisticated unmanned planetary exploration mission ever undertaken.

"I think the chances of putting down two Vikings safely are fairly small," said Dr. Conway Snyder of the Jet Propulsion Laboratory. (The second Viking is to land in early September.) "The chances of landing one successfully are better, but probably less than 90 per cent."

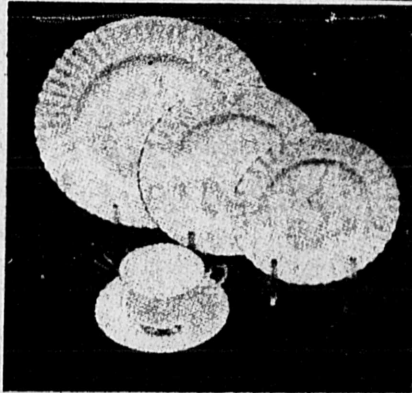

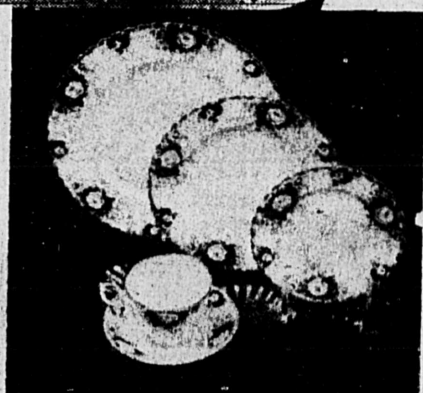
