He said that promiscuity has become old-fashioned among the young and that a substan-tial number of teen-agers are having sex but on a more selective, steady-partner basis than five years ago.

Of the 1,196 reported cases of VD in Ontario last year, persons between 15 and 19 made up 16 per cent-compared with about 30 per cent in 1972.

We have no way to pin it down statistically—but it's happen-Most parents don't want to know—or admit—that it is happening to their children. They dismiss the fact that the love generation of the 1960s irrevocably changed society's attitude to sex and that today's youngsters mature biologi-cally earlier than ever before, said Lynn Carleton, a Toronto

abortion clinic counsellor. "I wish more parents understood that if they discuss birth control with their teen-agers, they're not necessarily encouraging sexual activity," she said. "If I had a teen-age daughter who was determined to have sex, I'd make sure she knew how to protect herself." Of the 1,290 pregnant women

Miss Carleton has seen at her clinic so far this year, more than 25 per cent were under 20.

"I've seen so many young women forced to pay the price of not knowing about con-traception—or not knowing where to get it," she said. Their mothers simply close their eyes to these girls' sex

Dr. Peter Cole, chief family planning officer for the city of Toronto, said teen-agers who want contraception without their parent's consent need a 'lot of luck and persistence.'

He said, "They won't go to their parents and they won't go

Teens do less bed-hopping stuff from their friends. Kids get sex information on the

Dr. Cole said it will be at least 10 years before parents accept the fact that today's

youngsters have sex lives. "It'll take that long to fight the groups who want sex con-trol," he said. "They are the people who object when we publicize our family planning

services."
Sex lost some of its mystique back in the heady days of the 60s. The tradition-loosening effects of the pill, drugs, women's lib and social revolt left the teen-agers of the '70s a legacy of mandatory partici-

Yet, said one teen counsellor, young lovers can be the most romantic of all. Their obsession with spontaneity is one of the main reasons why they shy away from contracep-
