Speedy trio takes Porsche to upset victory

(AP) — Hurley Haywood of Florida, co-winner in 1973 and 1975, and two other drivers, who were victims of a controversial finish last year, combined for a steady performance that brought their Porsche Carrera to an upset victory Sunday in the 24 Hours of Daytona endurance race.

Haywood, who co-drove with Peter Gregg in earlier triumphs, teamed with John Graves and Dr. Dave Helmick, also of Florida, to cover 2,615 miles at better than a 108 milesan-hour

average.
In second place, about 10 miles behind, were Italians Martino Finotto and Carlo Facetti in a Porsche 935 turbo. Another 935, which led most of the race until a long pit stop and gave the eventual winners the lead at the 21-hour mark, was third, co-driven by Reinhold Joest of Germany and Bob Wollek of France, 40 miles back.

Actor Paul Newman and Californians Milt Minter Elliott Robinson motored to an impressive fifth place in a Ferrari Daytona, behind another Carrera, piloted by Californians Brad Friselle and George Dyer.

A large crowd-about 50,000 over the two days — watched under cool,

Early leaders and pre-race favorites Jacky Ickx of Belgium and Jochen Mass retired with about eight hours left after Mass crashed their 935 for the second time in the same place on the track. Tires were blamed in both cases.

Misfortune also struck Gregg, a three-time winner whose bid for the lead near the mid-point was ended by a three-hour transmission rebuild that cost his team 100 laps.

The incident, possibly the result of sabotage, precipitated the unprecedented halting of the Graves - Helmick -O'Steen entry was ruined beyond hope.

Campbell likes challenge

EDMONTON (CP) - Hugh Campbell is "looking forward to the challenge" of his first job as a head coach in the Canadian Football League.

Campbell's appointment as head coach-a two-year contract—was announced Friday by Edmonton Eskimos, the Western Football Conference club he helped beat on a number of occasions in the 1960s as an outstanding pass receiver for Saskatchewan Roughriders.

A quiet talker, Campbell told a news conference that his first priority will be to select a coaching staff-"I have six or seven names in mind.'

Then, he said, he will strive to form an "exciting, disciplined, well-drilled team" with a good sound defence and an offence that would not be too predictable, one that would retain the "element of surprise."

In the Eskimos Campbell, 35, inherits a club that slipped into third place in 1976 after winning three consecutive WFC championships and the Grey Cup in 1975.

He has experience in re-building a football team. He has been head coach at Whitworth College in Spokane, Wash., since 1970, where he took over a football program that was almost extinct—

In the last five years Whitworth has won 67per cent of its games and Campbell was Montana State and San Jose selected coach of the year in the Pacific Northwest Confer-

ence three times.

Campbell decided early in his playing career that he wanted to become a coach, and set out to gain the required knowledge. He worked with the coaching

staffs at Washington State University-where he played his college football—from 1963 to 1967 while still an active player in the CFL; then served

Whitworth had played only one as an assistant coach at game in the two previous Washington State in 1968 and

State and during the last four years helped out at WFC training camps—with Saskatche-wan in 1973 and with Winnipeg Blue Bombers from 1974 to

In six years with Saskatchewan, Campbell caught 60 touchdown passes, set a single-season CFL record for most touchdown passes caught - 17 in 1966 —and played in two Grey Cup games-1966

Confusion may end

As CAHA president, Johnson will be Canada's official representative at the World Hockey Championships in Vienna in March and there are hopes in the association that Eagleson will agree to serve as an alternate delegate.

During a news conference after the CAHA semi-annual meeting, Johnson denied that the CAHA has taken a back seat to the professionals in international hockey.

'We're realistic and accept that the pros can put together a much better team than us," he said. "With the inception of amateur-professional tournaments, our work switched to the development level for amateur players.

He said the semi-annual meeting approved a \$523,000 development budget for coaches, referees and mana-

Gordon Renwick, CAHA vic-epresident said: "We could use five million for our development programs. If you know where we can get the money, we'll gladly take it."
