## Canada signs n-pact

OTTAWA (CP) — Canada signed a nuclear agreement with the U.S. Tuesday that might break a deadlock with Japan and European countries over nuclear safeguards and Canadian uranium shipments. Energy Minister Alastair

Gillespie said after the signing here that Canada should be able to complete a new nuclear agreement with Japan and the European community by the end of this year.

This should clear the way for resumption of Canadian uranium shipments to these countries. Canada suspended shipments early this year to countries which had not accepted Canadian safeguards against use of nuclear technology and material for explosive purposes.

explosive purposes.

Gillespie indicated the accord with the U.S. is significant in that it would be tough for Canada to maintain its strong stand on safeguards without U.S. agreement.

The interim agreement, signed by External Affairs Minister Don Jamieson and U.S. Ambassador Thomas Enders, will permit use of Canadian uranium in U.S. civil nuclear reactors.

The agreement will give Canada control over Canadian uranium bought by the U.S. and sold to a third country. For example, Canadian uranium

OTTAWA (CP) — Canada might be enriched in the U.S. and sold to another country, say Japan, but only with prior agreement from Canada.

The external affairs department said in a statement the agreement "acknowledges Canada's leadership role in matters of non-proliferation" of nuclear weapons.

Jamieson said after the signing that "anything that brings Canada and the U.S. closer together on the nuclear proliferation issue is obviously beneficial with other customer countries." Canada and the U.S. would not be standing

separately on the safeguards issue but would be reinforcing each other.

Gillespie noted that the U.S. has already reached a nuclear agreement with Japan. All that remained was a settlement between Canada and Japan to clear away remaining obstacles.

Jamieson and Gillespie said the interim agreement does not resolve all the problems on "double labelling"—separate U.S. and Canadian safeguards on Canadian uranium bought by the Americans and sold to a third country.

# NEW INDUSTRY TO PAY THROUGH THE NOSE

In 1985 several small industries wishing to establish in Prince George required a total of 160 acres of industrial land for their ventures. Their representative went to city hall and requested information from the planner as to the possible sites upon which to locate. When he arrived, the planner warmly smiled, and asked if he is Mr. Ripoff who wrote the Chamber of Commerce. The industrialist replied, "my real name is Mr. Ratrace, but people have nicknamed me Ripoff and sometimes Promoter, but that's O.K. So, Mr. Bureaucrat what properties have you got lined up?". With a confident smile the planner replied, "we've got your problem solved". He takes Mr. Ratrace to a beautiful painting on the wall. "See this purple blotch here and there, well Mr. Ripoff, we planned a long time ago for this day. Just take your pick of these three industrial sites and you're in business". "Who owns the land, Mr. Bureaucrat", said the industrialist. "No problem", says the planner, "It belongs to the Goodguy families. I'll just call one of them and tell them you finally arrived". The industrialist a bit surprised gets on the phone and talks to Mr. H. Goodguy, "Mr. Goodguy, how much do you want for your 160 acres?" Only \$25,000,000.00 is the reply. "That's outrageous", says the industrialist, "are you sure you didn't mean \$2,500,000.?". "Not at all", says Mr. Goodguy confidents to the property of dently, "there is a limited supply you know and the other Goodguy families who have that much industrial land are each asking \$40,000,000.00 for the same amount of land but I've lowered my price because I'm near the airport and because I'm getting old and would like to retire soon". The industrialist angrily slams down the receiver and says to the planner, "that's outrageous, our shareholders can't afford it, its more than the amount we need to raise to build our entire industries. Our shareholders can't afford it, what's the score here anyway, your Chamber of Commerce told us this was a good place to establish. Do you have any further suggestions before I leave?". The Planner looks worried and says, "Mr. Ripoff, I guess we kind of made a mistake, by planning everything so rigidly and so far ahead, but that's now the officially adopted community plan and its going to involve a lot to change things. You see we never thought that rip-off artists like you would be concerned about the price and because they called you Mr. Ripoff and sometimes Mr. Promoter I was not concerned. I doubt if there is any cheap land left around." The industrialist turns to leave. "Wait, don't go away yet, Mr. Ripoff, I think I can help you and solve our problem. You see this dark green here, well that's designated for parks and green belt and this light green is for rural and agriculture and its cheap land belonging to Mr. Poorguy". "Oh, but we are not interested in building on farmland or in the parks, Mr. Bureaucrat" says the industrialist, "we want to put up several factories". "Well", says the Planner, "most of the Poorguy families like to see new jobs and new money so I think we'll be able to persuade our politicians to amend the plan even though a lot of the Poorguy families in the vicinity will be angry and object to it. First, just go and take an option from Mr. Poorguy on the land and then do some lobbying with the politician Family then officially announce your intentions to get a lot of favourable publicity, then apply for rezoning of Poorguy's property.
