The Soviet Union says that the Geneva conference should be the main forum for negotiating a peace settlement and that it cannot be used as a rubber stamp for agreements between Israel and Egypt in which most of the Arab world is not taking part.

Being left out of the Cairo summit meeting has upset Moscow and might force the Kremlin to have second thoughts of Geneva and move even deeper into the camp of the hardline Arab states opposing Sadat's negotiations with Israel.

This might signal danger because Israel is not in a position to make the key concession Sadat feels he needs-the creation of a Palestinian state without strings-thus leaving Sadat oepn for even more criticism from his Arab opponents.

Political and military committees will do the spadework starting next month in Cairo and Jerusalem. They will report to the main Cairo plenary meetings to draw up a comprehensive settlement.

It is Egypt's hope that eventually other Arab states and Palestinian representatives also will participate.

At his Monday news conference, Sadat said there would be a role for the United States and the United Nations, if they wish, in the political committee but the military committee would be bilateral-Egypt and Israel, that is.

"As for the United States, it will be in the political commit-tee, without the Soviet Union," Sadat said. "We didn't exclude them (the Soviets). They excluded themselves.

The Soviet Union called such talks "notorious" and would

Soviet President Leonid Brezhnev, who outlined a peace plan considered to be cinciliatory last March, said this weekend the Soviet Union still supports a Geneva conference. However, he rejected the negotiations going on in

"We by no means consider that the road of unilateral concessions such as the notorious talks of the Egyptian and Israeli leaders leads to this goal," Brezhnev declared.

Sadat, however, has not close the door on Geneva. He said he always has believed that without preparation, going to Geneva would turn into another failure.

What we are doing here in Cairo is the preparation for Geneva," he said. "Geneva is not excluded.'

The Geneva conference on the Middle East is part of the machinery set up by the United Nations to negotiate a peace settlement after the 1973 ArabIsraeli war. The Soviet Union and the United States are its cochairmen, Geneva, boycotted by Suria,

was a failure in 1973, but in the United Nations it still is considered the best forum for achieving peace in the Middle



When the driver's activities were discovered by post office management, he was given a choice of resigning






