Whymark returns to England

Whymark, whose name became a household word in this city after the Vancouver Whitecaps won the coveted North American Soccer League 1979 Soccer Bowl, has been sold to Grimsby Town of the English Second Division.

Whymark, who has previously said he wanted to return to England after having difficulty adjusting to North American life, scored 25 goals during his two seasons with the Whitecaps, a club spokesman said today.

His two most famous goals were in the Whitecaps 2-1 win over Tampa Bay Rowdies in the Soccer Bowl.

The Whitecaps made a number of other announcements, which follow John Giles taking the reins as coach this Goalkeeper David Harvey has been sold to Leeds United of the English First Division, his former club, the spokesman said. The Whitecaps are to retain

NASL rights over Harvey.
The club also has agreed in principle to transfer goalkeeper Bruce Grobelaar to Liverpool of the English First Division. The 22-year-old played 23 games last season.

Earlier this season, the Whitecaps turned down an offer of \$1 million for Grobelaar from liverpool. Terms of the current deal were not released.

Grobelaar previously hesitated to make the move, fearing it would take two or three seasons to break into Liverpool's first string. However, the spokesman said Liverpool has promised the goalkeeper he will see first-team action

Two other players have signed threeyear contracts with the Whitecaps. Giles described one player, David Thomas, a veteran English International winger, as probably the best crosser of the ball in all England.

Thomas now plays with Wolverhampton of English First Dvision.

The other player, 21-year-old defender Pierce O'Leary, has been under Giles' tutelage as coach and part-owner of the Irish Rovers.

The club spokesman said Vancouver also has obtained right of first refusal for English First Division goalie Ray Clemence. The 34-year-old has played 449 matches with Liverpool.


