# Ottawa urged to act

SURREY, B.C. (CP) -The Canadian government should intervene on behalf of seven Soviet dissidents who have been in the basement of the U.S. embassy in Moscow for more than three years, say Christian fundamentalists in the Vancouver suburb of Surrey.

Peter Vashchenko, his wife and three daughters, and Maria Chmykhalov and ber son. Timofei, refuse to leave the embassy unless they and 35 other family members are given permission by the Soviet government to emigrate. They went to the embassy June 27, 1978, seeking permission to emigrate to the U.S.

The fundamentalists in Surrey have formed The Siberian Seven Action Group which they hope is the start of a grassroots movement across Canada to help the seven Soviet Pentecostals, said group president Kirk Duncan, pastor of the Bible Fellowship Church in Surrey.


