Arts groups incensed by postal hikes

TORONTO - Perform- brief submitted ing arts groups across the country are hopping mad at the new Canada Post Corporation for imposing mail 77 professional theatres, 69 rates which they say hamper their ability to stay afloat financially.

"We view this matter with the utmost seriousness," says Betty Webster, executive director of the Association of Canadian Orchestras. ACO is one of five national arts service associations meeting this weekend in Toronto to seek new ways of breaking a current deadlock in discussions with an unsympathetic post

Webster believes that current postal policy makes no sense at a time when other branches of the federal government are pursuing cultural policies which force arts groups to rely less heavily on funding from Ottawa and more on their own fiscal initiatives.
