And by that time, it's too late to do anything about many disorders. If a child doesn't use both

eyes from infancy - if one eye is weaker and he comes to rely on his stronger eye then the vision in the less used eye is usually permanently lost, experts say.

But research being done at McMaster University may soon give parents those answers while their children are still young enough to receive corrective treatment.

Dr. Terri Lewis, director of the research program, and Dr. Daphne Maurer principal investigator, are attempting to find out what constitutes normal vision in children who are too young to read eye charts or even to say what they are seeing.

They have spent 18 months testing more than 100 children aged 1, 2 and 3 and plan to test even youn-
