There are few country singers who can rightly be called legends, but Wilf Carter is definitely one. This year the 78year-old cowboy balladeer is celebrating his 50th anniversary as a recording artist.

RCA, the company he signed with in 1933, has marked the occasion by releasing a two-record set containing 24 songs that span his career.

Entitled 50 Golden Years, the album opens with the title track, a new Carter composition recorded with some of Toronto's best studio musicians, none of whom was born when the second cut, My Swiss Moonlight Lullaby, was recorded in 1933.

There are a few other new cuts, but mostly the album is a retrospective of his long, distinguished career, and the songs present a good cross-section of Carter's music over the last five decades


