# Gretzky trade year's biggest surprise

Wayne Gretzky and Guy Lafleur, two names that speak volumes for the game of hockey, dominated The Canadian Press sports poll of 1988.

Gretzky's trade to the Los Angeles Kings was voted the surprise of the year in Canadian sports while Lafleur's return to the NHL after a four-year absence was selected comeback of the year in the annual poll of sportswriters and broadca-sters by The Canadian Press and Broad-

On Aug. 9 the unthinkable happened. The Edmonton Oilers traded Gretzky to the Kings.

One newspaper likened it to Paris losing the Eiffel Tower or New York selling the Statue of Liberty.

"It's like taking all the bridges away and saying, 'Edmonton, this is what you're going to look like,'" said distraught

### Lafleur earns top comeback honor from CP

Edmonton Mayor Laurence Decore.

The trade caught all Canadians and the entire international hockey community with their shinpads drooping and was voted the overwhelming winner as surprise of the year in the CP survey.

The Gretzky trade received 36 votes as surprise of the year, more than double the 17 ballots naming the Ben Johnson steroid scandal as most surprising. Other runners-up in the surprise ballot were, with nine votes, figure skater Elizabeth Manley's silver-medal performance at the Winter Olympics and with seven votes. Winter Olympics and, with seven votes, the Grey Cup victory by the Winnipeg

In nine seasons as an Oiler, Gretzky had broken practically every scoring record.

He holds the NHL record for most goals (92), assists (163) and points (215) in a season. He is the all-time assist leader and by the end of this season could surpass Gordie Howe's all-time points total of

Last May Gretzky and the Oilers won their fourth Stanley Cup in five years and the Great One was named the Conn Smythe winner as the most valuable player in the playoffs.

Rumors of a trade surfaced in late July but Canadians, despite the free-trade negotiations with the United States, were not inclined to believe another national treasure was California-bound.

Gretzky signed a five-year contract in the autumn of '87, making him a free

agent without compensation in 1992.
"When I agreed (last) September I figured that would be my last year," said

Gretzky, 27. "I knew I was gone."

Gone too, but not forgotten, was the flashy left winger who wore No. 10.

When a balding, 37-year-old man with a

nicotine habit scored the first New York Ranger power-play goal of 1988, the return of Guy Lafleur was official.

Lafleur retired in November 1984 after 14 seasons — including three scoring championships, five Stanley Cups and MVP honors twice - as the tour de force of the Canadiens.

"Maybe I'm not as motivated as in my big years," a teary-eyed Lafleur said at the time of his retirement.

Almost four years later the Flower bloomed again.
"I felt like an 18-year-old trying to make the team again," he said of the Rangers training camp. "I'm here to help the team and enjoy the game again."
On Dec. 17 Lafleur returned to the Montreal Forum as a New York Ranger. Side-

Canadien could only hobble to centre ice during a pre-game ceremony to the cheers of the Montreal faithful.

He donned a Rangers jersey and the cheering continued unabated. Guy Lafluer had truly returned. had truly returned.

## Bengals' pivot most valuable

by Associated Press Quarterback Boomer Esiason of the Cincinnati Bengals, the key fig-ure in Cincinnati's recovery from a four win, 11-loss record last year, has been named the NFL's most valuable player by The Associated

Esiason, who had the best rating of any NFL passer, completed 57 per cent of his passes and threw for 3,572 yards. That mark included 28 touchdowns with only 14 interceptions as the Bengals took control of the AFC Central early.

With a 12-4 record this season With a 12-4 record this season, the Bengals captured the division title and home field advantage throughout the playoffs. The Bengals' first playoff game is Saturday against Seattle.

Esiason won the award in a close, three-way vote among sportswriters and broadcasters covering each of the NFL's 28 teams.





## **Must-win contest** for Team Canada

SASKATOON (CP) — Dave King sat high above the ice surface of Saskatchewan Place on Thursday, his mind and his eyes busy searching for weaknesses in the Soviet Union's national hockey team.

King's Canadian team, 5-3 losers to Czechoslovakia in Wednesday's opener of the three-country Saskatchewan Cup international tournament, must beat the Soviets tonight to have a chance to make Sunday's final of the single roundrobin championship.

The Soviets rallied with three

unanswered third-period goals Thursday - the winner by Aleksander Semak at 10:02 - to defeat Czechoslovakia 4-3. That result assured Czechoslovakia a berth in the final.

Canada must beat the Soviets, whom they defeated 5-4 in a pretournament game Tuesday, by at least two goals to reach the final. A Canadian win would leave all teams with a 1-1 record and the championship berths would be decided by a goals ratio.

"No ifs, ands or buts - we put the pressure on ourselves (by losing Wednesday)," said Canadian forward Mark Jooris.

"But the feeling on the team is that we can do it. We played a ter-rible game when we beat them 5-4 and it wasn't lucky goaltending...so we're going to play a good

game. That's the type of confidence King wants from his over-matched

squad of youngsters and former "We always knew we would have to beat the Soviets," he said. "And we can. We did it in Prince Albert.

"But the Soviets are the best team in the tournament, and we'll have to be at our best."

Goaltender Warren Skorodenski, expected to get the starting assignment tonight, said the Canadians will have to find a way to slow down the pace of the Soviets.

"I'll have to hold on to everything, just to slow them down," he said after watching the rapid pace of the first period of Thursday's

The Soviets could have put themselves in a better position with a more decisive win Thursday but the Czechoslovakians, knowing a one-goal loss assured them of a championship berth, hung tough.

"I can say one thing, it will be very difficult for us to play against Canada," Soviet coach Vladimir Vasiliev said after the Thursday

"The Canadians have a psychological advantage because they won the first game (between the two teams) and we need to play better than tonight to win."

Czechoslovakian coach Ivan Hlinka, a former Vancouver Canuck, was smiling when asked which team he would like to meet in the

"We like to beat the better team," he said, thinking about the Soviets and the Canadians going after each other in a must-win game while his team gets to rest. "Who is best is the other teams' problems. They have to decide

Hlinka's squad looked to be the better team for two periods Thursday night. Goals by Ladislav Kames, Jiri Hlinka and Kamil Kastak had given them a 3-1 lead heading into the final period.

But the youthful yet powerful Soviets roared to life in the third period, outshooting Czechoslovakia 18-7 and outscoring them 3-0. The Soviets capitalized with

goals by Igor Maslennikov at 2:06 and Sergei Svetlov at 3:47.

From then it was simply a matter of time before the Soviets took the lead and the only real question was whether the Czechoslovakians could hold the deficit to a single
