With the major-league championship series starting Tuesday, Oct. 3, at last we'll see that there is more to the baseball season than the Pete Rose gambling scandal. The four division champions finally get their chance to grab headlines.

According to a computer search committee commissioned by Mead Data Central, a company servicing newspapers and wire services, pure baseball hasn't gotten much coverage in the 1980s. Announcer Dick Irvin calls it like he see it

Dick Irvin, the 57-year-old veteran color man on Montreal Canadiens hockey telecasts, says the greatest player he ever saw was Guy Lafleur.

Irvin gets plenty of argument on that count. But he sticks by his assessment, even after having seen the likes of Wayne Gretzky, Bobby Orr and even the great Maurice Richard.

Not surprisingly, Irvin says the greatest hockey team he ever saw was the Montreal Canadiens of the mid-1970s, coached by Scotty Bowman, which won four consecutive Stanley Cups.

Irvin will be on hand this Saturday, Oct. 7, when CBC signs on for another season of "Hockey Night in Canada." It will be a break with tradition, too. "HNIC" will have a doubleheader that night, beginning with a Buffalo-Montreal or Detroit-Vancouver game, followed by an Ed-

Next, it's on to the American League and National League championship series, starting Oct. 3 and 4 respectively. CTV will carry all post-season play in Canada, including the World Series.
