They practise what they preach

and justice are more than just words to the Ridd family.

Their dedication to such principles has made them one of Winnipeg's most noted clans and peace activist Karen Ridd is just the most celebrated example.

The blonde former clown and star basketball player, who drew international attention when she was arrested in El Salvador last month, showed how much punch a Ridd can pack when she captured the hearts and minds of 150 Rotarians last week.

She faced a crowd that had come to hear a city councillor talk about changes to the City of Winnipeg Act.

Instead, they got a trip to a shantytown called Exodus, 28th of October, a refugee community in the capital of San Salvador where Ridd was arrested. It was named for the day it was established.
"It's a community of black plas-

tic," Ridd said to stunned sheller.
"A little bit of wood to make frames, a little bit of corrugated roofing to put on top."

An hour later, after receiving a stark account of abject poverty and civil war violence, the Rotarians gave Ridd a standing ovation. Last Thursday, External Affairs

Minister Joe Clark flew Ridd to Ottawa for a round-table meeting on the trouble in Central America. She learned about the freedom

she seeks for others at home, in the bosom of an unusual family. Father Carl Ridd, a former

Olympic basketball player who loves making bad puns, has spent a good deal of his life espousing freedom to his theology students at the University of Winnipeg.

She was arrested, interrogated and struck during her detention. Released the same day, she was never charged and left the country a few days later.




