# Soccer league not intimidating

Rick Siebel isn't worried playing in the newly formed North Cariboo Senior Soccer League.

Siebel's Timberline team meets Green Machine Sunday in the first round of the 1991 season. For Siebel and most of the other players, the amalgamation of the Prince George Senior Soccer League into the expanded NCSSL, doesn't make a difference.

"I have no problem with it," said Siebel, 35. "Although I am getting up there."

The new 12-team league begins play at 11 a.m. Sunday at Rotary. Labatt's Honda North will play Quesnel in the other 11 a.m. match. All teams will play in Sunday's round.

The North Cariboo has traditionally represented the city's highest calibre senior soccer while the other league stressed a more recreational flavor. The new league will feature two divisions meeting in a series of interlocking exhibition games.

"I think some of the roughness has gone out of both leagues in the last few years," Siebel added early today. "We are out to play soccer, not roughhousing.'

Glen Thompson, NCSSL president, said the games between the Cariboo division teams and the recreation division will be purely on an exhibition basis with no goals or scores recorded.

"I think the main challenge this year will make a go of this one league, two division trial basis,' Thompson said Thursday. "There isn't anything definite yet."

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) -With nine more hits and 16 fewer strikeouts than the night before in Texas, the Toronto Blue Jays seemed to be telling Kevin Appier he's no Nolan Ryan.

But in beating the staggering Kansas City Royals 3-1 immediately after Ryan no-hit them, the Blue Jays were telling themselves something, too.

"Last night it was Nolan Ryan's night," said Roberto Alomar, who struck out three times, including the final out of the game, in Ryan's 3-0 no-hitter Wednesday

Alomar did not have a single strikeout against Appier (1-4) or reliever Jeff Montgomery. But he did have a sacrifice that set up a run in the first inning, a double in the third and a homer in the sixth.

The same team that struck out 16 times against Ryan did not fan once against the Royals and

quickly put to rest any thoughts of a second straight no-hitter when Devon White doubled leading off the game. Alomar sacrificed him to third and the Blue Jays seized a 1-0 lead on Joe Carter's sacifice

fly. One might think the leadoff double must have been particularly relaxing to the Blue Jays.

"Relaxing because of the no-hitter?" Carter asked. "It didn't mean a thing. It meant he was on second base and Robby gets him over and I get him in.

"Nobody was thinking about what happened last night. The nohitter's out of the way. It's a different night."

The Royals' sixth straight home loss leaves them two shy of the club record.

Todd Stottlemyre (3-0) pitched seven innings of two-hit ball. Mike Timlin pitched a hitless eighth and Duane Ward picked up his sixth save with a hitless ninth off a team mired in a deep and disturbing hitting slump.

## Women's league prospers

Patti Smith says she never played soccer until she moved to Prince George.

But Smith, 29, is now a sevenyear veteran of the Prince George Women's Soccer League. She credits a good first coach and a friendly league attitude as she and the 80 other members of the league prepare for Monday's start of league play.

"Back in 1984 I had a friend who was coaching the one team in town and I came out," said Smith. "I had never played before."

The four-team league has at-tracted players of all ages. Last year a city team finished fourth in the B.C. Summer Games in Prince George.

What was once a single team that played inter-squad pickup games between travelling to Quesnel is now a self-supporting organization with players ranging in age from 19 to almost 40 years.

Part of the growth has been the city's large youth soccer league, the biggest single participation league in Prince George. Another reason is the attitude of the players, added Smith.

'We are trying to develop soccer on a recreational level and try-ing not too be too competitive," she said. "Leaving the door open to people who have never com-

Steve Lamble was Smith's first coach. He coached his the women's team in the city in 1983 and watched it expand into a league in 1987.

This year he is leaving the women's league to coach his daughter's team in the youth league. The Vancouver native once coached Vancouver 86ers' star John Catliff in the city's youth league.

Women's soccer is not unlike any other form of the game, Lamble said early today.

"The game appeals to the whole spectrum of capabilities," he said. 'It can be enjoyed by people just starting out for the first time.

"It has that appeal."
