Garcia's wives fight

SAN RAFAEL, Calif. (AP) — The final tally on Jerry Garcia's estate: \$9.9 million, including comic books, fine art and real estate.

And his ex-wives are still fighting over it.

Lawyers for his third and last wife, Deborah Koons Garcia, asked a judge to reverse his decision awarding a \$4.6-million divorce settlement to wife No. 2, Carolyn (Mountain Girl) Garcia. They cited legal technicalities.

Judge Michael Dufficy, who approved the settlement in January, said he'd consider the objections before issuing a final decision. The value of Garcia's property had been kept secret since the rock musician's death in a drug treatment center in August 1995. He was 33.

Court records valued it last week at \$9.9 million.

Besides the ex-wives, an assortment of business partners, former lovers and acquaintances have filed more than \$38 million in claims against the estate. Some have been settled and others are pending.

Gardener drops suit

BRIDGEPORT, Conn. (AP) — Martha Stewart's former gardener, who washed cars and groomed pets besides tending the grounds, has withdrawn his lawsuit claiming she owed him more than \$20,000 in back pay.

Renaldo Abreu lost his battle March 19 when a state trial referee ruled against him. On Thursday, Abreu dropped his appeal and fired his lawyer. The state referee ruled that Abreu was an agricultural worker who is exempt from overtime.

Rosie sets a limit

NEW YORK (AP) — There are a few people Rosie O'Donnell says she'll never have on her show and at the top of her list is her adopted son, Parker.

"Parker is not going to be on TV unless he's 18 and that's what he chooses to do with his life. His mom's on TV, he isn't," O'Donnell said.

"This business is very corrupting, and I don't want him to be a part of it. As much as I can keep him away from it, I will," O'Donnell said in an interview.

Gift is a joke

WASHINGTON (AP) — Al Gore's gift on his 49th birthday? Billy Crystal.

The comedian and Oscar host poked fun at the vice-president during the Academy Awards last week, telling the audience: "The only one guaranteed with waking up with a statue is Tipper Gore."

Gore's staff said Crystal and singer Johnny Cash each called in their best wishes during a Monday party also attended by President Bill Clinton.

Shock group opposed

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — The 1,000 tickets sold so far for a concert by shock rockers Marilyn Manson barely outnumber complaints against the show.

Stan Carter was among 800 people who called, faxed and e-mailed the mayor's office in the last week to protest the group, who has hit it big with the album Antichrist Superstar.

"The man (Manson) is pressing hatred and dislike and violence toward Christians," Carter said. "This man is a slap in the face. He's no less an affront than Nazis marching down Myrtle Avenue."

Marilyn Manson is the name of the band and its frontman, Brian Warner, who took his stage moniker from Marilyn Monroe and Charles Manson.

Director can't collect

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The director of White Men Can't Jump says 20th Century Fox isn't upholding his contract.

Ron Shelton has sued the studio, claiming he was denied half the net profits and part of the gross receipts.

In closing arguments, lawyer Brian Lysaght said the movie made \$50 million. But, he said, "the 'Alice in Wonderland' world of big studio Hollywood accounting" showed a \$10-million loss for the studio.

Studio lawyer Louis Meisinger said Shelton misunderstood the definition of net profits and gross receipts.

Krauss is back — fit as a fiddle

So Long, So Wrong is first album of all-new material in five years

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Alison Krauss, master of the ethereal ballad, is hooting — loudly, indelicately and persistently.

The 25-year-old musician is looking at old photographs of herself in one of her band member's scrapbook.

"Oh my Gawd!" she screeches. "Not much I can do about some ugly pictures!"

Krauss, thin and blond, has seen her every fashion risk and hair style regularly plastered in local newspapers since winning fiddle contests as a child.

The clippings multiplied as an adult when her 1995 compilation CD, Now That I've Found You: A Collection, sold more than two million copies and catapulted her fame beyond the bluegrass world.

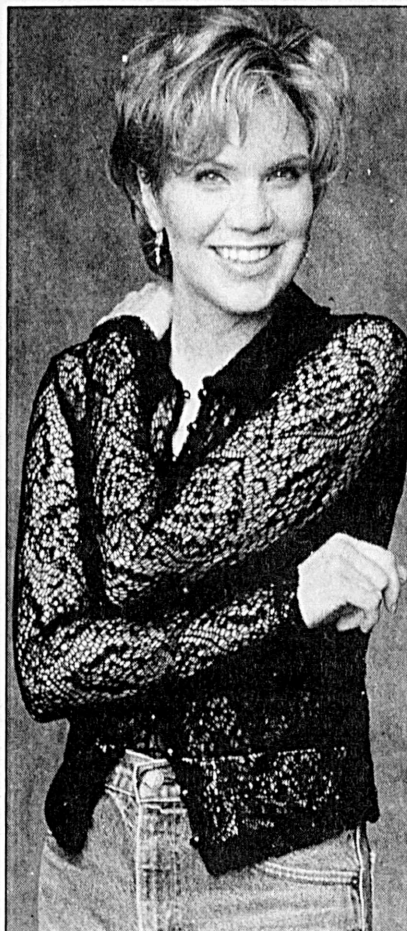
She subsequently was named the Country Music Association's female vocalist of the year.

During the height of Alison Krauss fever in 1995, the singer regularly was stricken with migraine headaches. Two years later, mainstream country music radio stations have moved on to new phenomena such as LeAnn Rimes.

Krauss says the migraines are a thing of the past and she's learned to live with the costs of celebrity.

"I think you can easily disappoint the people that you meet," Krauss said. "I remember there was this little girl in Virginia who was sick and this guy gave me her picture and said, 'Call her on the phone and say hi to her — she loves you.'"

"I lost that picture that had her num-

ber on the back. See, they don't know that I lost it. They just think I'm a jerk!"

Coming off a two-month vacation, Krauss was visibly refreshed and high-spirited as she anticipated the release of her band's first album of all-new material in five years.

So Long, So Wrong is out on her longtime label, the independent Rounder Records.

It is definitely a band album, mixing traditional bluegrass (a short, burning instrumental of the standard Little Liza Jane), lead vocals by other members of her band, Union Station, and hypnotic ballads that are Krauss' trademark (It Doesn't Matter and I Can Let Go Now).

Krauss remains devoted to fellow musicians Barry Bales, Ron Block, Adam Steffey and Dan Tyminski. The band has been billed as Alison Krauss and Union Station for several years.

"If I was going solo, I would ask all those guys to play on the record," Krauss said.

PBS detective Cadfael fights crime with logic

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Imagine a detective who solves crimes without fingerprints or DNA and can pursue the culprits only on horse-drawn vehicles. That's Brother Cadfael, the Benedictine monk of the Middle Ages.

Cadfael, starring Derek Jacobi, can be seen in new shows and reruns during April and early May on PBS's admirable *Mystery*, hosted by Diana Rigg. Unlike Chief Inspector Morse, Adam Dalgliesh, Hercule Poirot and other sleuths of the series, Cadfael lacks any modern methods of detection.

"Everything has to be done by logic," says Jacobi, whose distinguished career in the English theatre has earned him a Sir before his name.

Brother Cadfael, based on the Ellis Peter novels, is no stranger to violence. He had been a soldier in the Crusades, and he had to do some killing himself. Perhaps as penitence, he has joined the Benedictine abbey in Shrewsbury, England, where he pursues the growing of herbs. His potions sometimes help solve the crimes he encounters.

Jacobi is no stranger to idiosyncratic characters, his most notable to TV watchers being the title role in *I, Claudius* and Hitler in *Inside the Third Reich*. He also has made a number of films, often in villainous roles. Among them: *The Odessa File*, *The Medusa Touch*, *Little Dorrit*, *The Tenth Man* and *Dead Again*.

Cadfael may look like unimpressive old England, but it's really shot in present-day Hungary.

"The landscapes resemble England a great deal and haven't changed in centuries," said Jacobi. "And there are many old ruins that fit the period."

He began the first season of *Cadfael* three years ago, when Hungary was emerging from the communist period.

"I must say I had my fill of goulash, paprika and Gypsy violin music," he said. "But it's different now. Hungary led the other former Iron Curtain countries into democracy, and it is doing very well now. You can get elegant meals, including Chinese and Indian."

Jacobi, 59, followed the generation of brilliant, heavy-drinking actors such as Richard Burton, Anthony Hopkins and Peter O'Toole. But he says he didn't fall into the same roistering pattern.

"I'm not a drinker," he said. "Drinking doesn't make me happy; it makes me sick. Two or three days of feeling miserable is not worth it."
