Broken promises

Gordon Campbell's slick Vancouver-centred Liberals, or the NDP with a damagedgoods label because of the problems when last in power, or the wacky Greens?

The Liberals are supposed to be a shoo-in to win this election. We hear Campbell repeatedly on TV telling us what good things the Liberals have done and will do for education, health care and forestry.

But what will he really do if he gets a majority? He assured us nine years ago that he would never sell B.C. Rail, and then he sold it immediately when he got into power. He said he would create jobs then had new ferries built in Germany.

We are told our forests will be tended and new trees planted, but we see no sign of this. One-hundred million fewer trees will be planted this year than in previous years and plans are for planting even fewer next year.

There is a need to plant tens of thousands of hectares where young forests have been wiped out by the beetles. Instead, Campbell has taken money given by Ottawa to help with the beetle problem to pay for things that have nothing to do with forestry, such as 18 million for the new Fraser Bridge and

money for airports and roads - things that should have been paid for out of general

It is no wonder that Ottawa now has suspended further payments of the \$1 billion over 10 years promised to help with the beetle problem.

So what about Carole James and the NDP? We do not see her much on TV, but she says no to Campbell's gas tax, which will be seven cents a litre if he has his way. I am against this tax. It costs us enough to drive without this cost, and there is no real evidence that humans have much effect on the world temperature, which is in a cooling trend.

If only we had workable referenda laws, then the people could have a say about some of these issues to the betterment of our province. Of course, Campbell promised us a workable referenda law nine years ago and then forgot about this as soon as he trotted into power.

The above are issues that must be considered when voting.
