Stickers come off doors while city looks for solutions

After months of complaints, the City of Prince George has agreed to take the 'disabled access' stickers off some of the washroom doors in the Civic Centre, but a permanent solution may still be months away.

The stalls in the washrooms are simply too small for some people's wheelchairs and city staff say they're working on the problem. The small stalls were noticed immediately after the Civic Centre was unveiled earlier this year but so far nothing has been done to fix them.

The issue has been championed by Vivian Candy, who tried to get into one of the stalls only to find her wheelchair didn't fit. Ms. Candy says she's been waiting for months for the City to do something about the design flaw. "Well, I don't know if it was the architect or the structural people, it could be

either, but the design was incorrect. The washroom on the second floor and the washroom in the changeroom on the first floor...are not wheelchair accessible. I've been asking the City to take off the emblems on the doors because they're not accessible. One way or another, we can't go on putting up with this kind of thing."

But Ms. Candy says taking the stickers off the door isn't enough. She wants the washrooms fixed soon. "We have put pressure on them from the SNAC (Special Needs Advisory Committee) that we want a time limit, that this really has to be looked into. If they don't do it, then we will start again. I mean, I'm not leaving it like this."

Leisure Services director Tom Madden says the City is moving on the issue and may have a solution by the New Year. "I don't know whether everything will be resolved by then to everyone's satisfaction but we're certainly going to try to do that. I don't know if it will be by year's end. Some of the things they'd like to see we may have to...budget for in subsequent years to get them done."

Ms. Candy says the washrooms don't conform to the
building code, but Mr. Madden
says that's not true. "It is built to
code. It's just...they would like
to see the code expanded, and
that's what we're looking at.
There's a couple areas where it's
just on the code and a slight
adjustment to it may allow it to
meet the things the SNAC committee has pointed out."

Mr. Madden also says not all the washrooms in the Civic Centre are the same way. "We have some individual units that are downstairs and they're fine. They're excellent examples of access for all, but the ones upstairs are a little tight and the ones in our dressing room areas are a little tight as well."

Four facing charges in kidnapping

Police say they've tracked down the suspects in the beating and robbery of a 26-year-old male which happened two weeks ago.
