UNBC residence costs going up

The second UNBC residence will likely cost more than the first one, even though university officials say it will be virtually identical to the existing complex.

Four companies have placed bids for the contract to build the new residence on the Prince George campus, and all the bids exceed the \$6.5-million cost of the first one.

Wayne Watson (Prince George) \$6,959,232; Western Industrial Contractors (Prince George) \$7,081,000; RJ Cooper (Prince George) \$7,472,521; Kraft Construction (Winnipeg) \$7,486,565.

Kraft Construction built the existing 274-bed residence. The new residence is expected to be completed in time for the start of the 1995 fall semester.

Accident claims five-year-old girl

A five-year-old girl has died two days after she was involved in a single-vehicle accident 32 kilometres west of Prince George.

Roxanne Lundgren, of Prince George, was driving her 1979 Chevrolet Malibu eastbound on

Highway 16 at around 3:30 p.m. when she lost control on the icy roads. Her vehicle rolled several times and five-year-old Kayla Lundgren was thrown from the car. Kayla was rushed to Prince George Regional Hospital and she

lived for two days but eventually died at 6 p.m. on December 22.

The condition of Ms. Lundgren has not been released. The accident is still under investigation but police say they have ruled out alcohol as a factor.

Police search for William Ranahan

There's a 34-year-old man out there named William George Ranahan and police want the public's help in finding him.

Mr. Ranahan is wanted on

charges of robbery and uttering threats involving a domestic dispute at a Prince George residence. He is believed to be driving a white, four-door 1982 Oldsmobile with the

license plate number JBJ-935.

Return of icy roads causing problems

A man was taken to Prince George Regional Hospital after he was involved in a two-vehicle accident on Boxing Day at one of the city's most dangerous intersections.

At around 1 p.m., two vehicles collided at North Nechako and Foothills Boulevard. One male driver had to be rescued by the Fire Department and he was taken to Prince George Regional Hospital with unknown

injuries, but they have been described as non-life threatening. Two females were also taken to PGRH and, again, the extent of their injuries is not known.

No names have been released.

Now that the cold weather has returned to the Prince George area, police want to warn the public that many intersections around town are extremely icy and they're asking people to slow down.
