Sell golf course, buy park

Steadman's plan for land panned by main opponents

Ruby Park, nearly 20 acres of land located at the intersection of Highways 16 and 97, is becoming the defining factor in the race for mayor.

Very early in the campaigning frenzy, the future of the property came to the fore. Mayoral candidate Tom Steadman announced he had "a plan" to have the city buy the property - a plan which he would expand on at a later date.

Competitor Don Basserman, at the other end of the spectrum, says he wants nothing to do with any purchase of Ruby Park. Candidate Colin Kinsley has taken the middle ground, saying he would like to see the property left as park land, but as more tourism-oriented park land than it currently is.

Steadman Mr. has announced his plan which hinges on the sale of the Pine Valley golf course, a piece of property he feels is not meeting its full potential.

"First, [the city] would have to find an alternative location for a par-three golf course, possibly along the Fraser River in the Cowart Road area, and then sell the Pine Valley golf course," explains Mr. Steadman.

"Why would you sell off one golf course to buy another golf course when you don't have to?" asks Mr. Bassermann. That's not to say he disagrees with the proposal to build an alternate Pine Valley golf course, however, but that it should be left to the private sector

"And if we built an alternative to Pine Valley, it would have to be in a comparable location within the Bowl area, and at a comparable cost.

He adds the city doesn't need to buy the property to "buy time," as the developer would have to come to city council for re-zona re-zoning application. The chips would fall where they may, but I feel I could exert some influence in that regard."

That's Colin Kinsley's sentiment as well.

"It really is unnecessary to buy Ruby Park to stop its development. We already have the control over its rezoning."

Mr. Kinsley doesn't see this as a very strong business plan.

"What I'm wondering is this: where are we going to get the money to, first, build the alternate golf course to replace Pine Valley and then, second, buy Ruby Park?

If he plans to get a loan to buy it, says Mr. Kinsley, he would need consent from the electorate, then manage a council-approved bylaw before the city to borrow

"It sounds to me like he's painted himself into a corner on this issue, and it does show his inexperience in the ways of municipal govern-

But, for Mr. Steadman, he sees the city's control as tenuous at best on this issue.

"Despite what Lois Boone says, it just wouldn't be wise for the city to go loggerheads with the province on this issue."

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
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
