Lodge getting own entrance

The downtown Rotary Club of Prince George is opening a new door for residents of Jubilee Lodge.

Rotary, through a threeyear fundrasing campaign, is donating \$100,000 to the local long-term care facility, money that will be used to build a new entrance at the corner of 15th Avenue and Alward Street. Currently, the only access to Jubilee Lodge is through Prince George Regional Hospital.
