

Pacific Western helping out B.C. rugby players

Pacific Western Brewing is helping out rugby in British Columbia.

The Prince George-based brewery, along with Victoria's Vancouver Island Brewery, have teamed up to support the B.C. Rugby Union with a \$20,000 scholarship and three draft beers for the use of the Union and its fans.

Three drafts will be called Scrum Dark, Propkick Pale Ale and Lineout Lager.

The sponsorship will help to provide needed equipment and funds for international competition. It will also enable the Union to provide better technical services to teams, increasing the quality of rugby in BC.

"Rugby is an important sport in B.C., but it is seriously under-funded," says Pacific Western Brewing's general manager Harry Mayor, "As one of the few remaining B.C.-owned breweries, we are pleased to be able to assist B.C.-based sports."

Rugby in Canada is predominantly an amateur sport that is becoming professional at the top levels. Canada is considered to have one of the top 10 teams in the world. In 1995, BC supplied 80 percent of the players for Canada's World Cup team.

Kings take show on road

The Kings are racking up wins against quality teams — two each against Vernon and Penticton. Watson attributes the surge to an increasing confidence and team chemistry.

"They get along really well and they're committed to what they need to do to win," says Watson.

The team suffered through some injuries and Watson says that helped bring up the confidence of younger players, who needed to step up their play.

As the team prepares to become road warriors, Watson is looking forward to the test.
