the ice a hockey team has to have three seperate units working together to win a game offence, defence and goaltending. Making those three parts all play well at the same time is what's eluded the Cougars in their past five home games, and what they'll need to make happen in time for playoffs.

"The last few games we've had certain people clicking and then not others," says forward Berkeley Buchko. "This time of year everyone has to be at the same time. Some nights our offence works, sometimes our defence and sometimes our goaltending, but never at the same time."

The syndrome of bad coordination between the three parts of the Cougars was evident in last week's losses against Kamloops and Wednesday's failed matchup with the Seattle Thunderbirds, the fifth home loss in a row for the Cats.

The Cougars hit the road this weekend almost certain of a western division playoff spot, but all but mathematically eliminated from any claim to

home-ice advantage. That could work to the Cougars advantage, says Buchko, considering their recent

results at home.

"We'll most likely be playing on the road in the first round. We didn't have the homestand we thought we would, but life goes on," says the 20-year-old.

"Making the fifth playoff

spot could be important.

But the way we played at home maybe it's not as important as people think, maybe playing on the road would be better for us."

The main goal now will be to hit the playoffs running with a winning record behind them as opposed to simply slipping into the sixth spot because of last-place Tri-City's losses. The key, says Buchko, will be reclaiming the coordination the Cougars had during the unprecedented seven-game winning streak last month.

"We've done it other times of the years in long stretches. We know how to do it, we just have to get it going. We had a good streak and we can do that again if we want to."

### Fewster favoured for juvenile curling provincials
