# **Tree planters** hurt by pessimism

Local tree planting companies are calling for a quick resolution to uncertainty in the logging industry, saying the current pessimism is hurting business

"The optimism of the client until the lumber agreement is signed just isn't there," says Wayne Wood of Nechako Restoration Services Ltd. "Until that's done they won't be in a better mood to deal with when you sit down and negotiate a contract."

Mr. Wood says companies are still cutting the same number of trees as required in their annual allowable cut, but are not spending as much money on details, leaving silviculture companies to pick up the tab.

"We're planting 30 per cent less than we were three years ago," he says

Through the process of certification, planters also require more training to make sure trees are planted in an environmental manner. Tree planters that do exist tend to be relative newcomers, making experienced fast and thorough staff harder to come by. "We haven't seen an increase in pay for two or three years and some of them are more likely to take a job at Earls," he says.

One of the biggest changes has been to employment standards, that's mostly what has increased our costs," he says. Add rising gas prices that are — or aren't — picked up by clients and the cost to send three planters even to Quesnel or Houston woods rises significantly.

Bob Butler, of Roots Reforestation Ltd., says this summer marks the first time his company hasn't sent tree planters out into the woods since 1978. Roots chooses instead to focus on grooming existing stands, brushing and spray herbicide as a more reliable source of income.

'For the last three years we've really cut back," says Mr. Butler. "But we found that even with one or two crews running as cheap as possible we weren't making any money.

In addition to a general slowdown in the industry where "everybody is planting less and less" he says the industry is being asked to conform to new standards that have made running crews in the wood more expensive.
